(2) Expanded Gambling

Massachusetts has one of the most successful lottery in the country, that support local aid to communities. I question the revenue numbers projected for casinos in Massachusetts.

(3) Health Care

It is a victory that 97.5% of the population in the Commonwealth has comprehensive health insurance. We still have work to do to make it more affordable, in particular for small business. I support the single payer option.

Criminal Justice

(7) YOUTH VIOLENCE

I believe quality education and revamping our school curriculum and staffing to meet the needs for a 21st century education. I think the BPD, Community Crime Watch programs, when properly staffed, have shown to be very successful in improving safety in our neighborhoods. Currently, this program has a limited staff.

(8) MANDATORY MINIMUMS

In general, we need court reform. The next step after the recently passed CORI Reform is sentencing reform especially for non violent drug related offenses.

(9) MEDICINAL MARIJUANA

Yes, I think the use of marijuana has been well documented for certain medical conditions and should be legalized.

Housing

(10) FORECLOSURE PREVENTION

The recent legislation passed by the legislature did not go far enough. We must protect homeowners as well as tenants. Banks need to negotiate reasonable mortgage terms using the actual value of the properties. Massachusetts must support banks that are part of our communities and not mega banks that have no stake in our community. As Eric Rosengren, the Federal Reserve President in Boston said, the foreclosure crisis must be addressed in a comprehensive and holistic manner.

(11) HOMELESSNESS

Support extending expiring use leases for affordable housing. Support 'Housing First' initiatives that place homeless people in housing (not shelters) first with supports built in to assist them to stay in housing.

(12) Environment

Environmental and Environmental Justice priorities:

1. Clean Water
2. Clean Air
3. Renewable Energy

Additionally, I believe that we must take steps to lower the environmental health risks that are prevalent in many low-

income communities. As president of the Boston branch NAACP, I worked to pass a national resolution against Level 4 Bio-labs being built in densely populated areas which often have a high population of people of color.

(13) Transportation

Quality public transportation is a cornerstone of smart growth and Boston's public transportation system needs the support of the legislature to make significant improvements and relieve the pressure of its enormous debt (approximately \$8 billion). I would also support an increase in transit-connected development such as the partnerships that are working on the Jackson Square projects.

Education

(14) ED REFORM

I would not have supported that legislation because it did not address the crisis we are facing with the high school drop-out rate nor did it deal with the complex needs of today's students. I served on the Governor's Task Force on Drop-out Prevention and believe strongly that comprehensive services must be provided to students early on in their educational careers. Additionally, there were issues with collective bargaining concerns.

(15) MCAS

Standardized tests should be one measure of student achievement and are appropriate only as part of a portfolio of indicators of learning.

(16) Women's Right to Choose

I would not only oppose any additional barriers to a woman's access to an abortion but I support elimination of existing laws on the books in Massachusetts which restrict access such as a mandatory waiting period for at-risk women.

(17) Welfare

Assistance levels must be evaluated with the cost of living. We all know that training programs have been effective in helping people bridge from public assistance to self sufficiency.
